## Valley Falls State Park Saw-whet Owl Banding Station for 2014

The 10th year of banding Northern Saw-whet Owls (NSWO) at Valley Falls State Park was the third lowest year for captures since this project began in 2005. The weather and the moon phase had a limiting effect on nights of activity and captures. There were numerous rainy and windy nights, and the brightness of the moon this year during the peak time of migration appeared to limit the numbers captured.

Banding began on October 23, 2014, and ended on November 25. Eighteen owls were captured in 2014, which is 40% below the 10-year average. There was one foreign recapture from Virginia. See Table 1. In addition, a red-phase Eastern Screech-Owl was captured and banded on the last night of operation.

The station operated on 12 nights with the nets being opened for 49 hours. Eight of the nights yielded owls, with a high of four NSWOs captured on both nights of October 24 and November 15.

Of the 18 captures, 7 were adults, 11 were hatch year birds. Females again led the way in captures in 2014 with 14 captures, and two males and two owls of unknown sex were captured. An owl caught on November 15 was an owl that was banded as a hatch year bird in November 2012 near Harrisonburg, Virginia. This was the only foreign recapture of the season.

After 10 years of banding, 291 NSWOs have been captured, including 26 foreign recaptures and one return. See Table 2. The breakdown shows a heavy advantage for females, 75% to 8% for males. The unknown category completes the last 17%. The adult, hatch year ratio is almost even with 52% adult to 48% hatch year individuals. The station has hosted nearly one thousand visitors from nine states and the District of Columbia.

The station had approximately 100 visitors from six states, including students from the WVU Wildlife Society and various groups and organizations from all over the state. Unfortunately, on two of the nights with the most visitors, no owls were captured. A special thanks to Meghan Jensen, a graduate assistant at West Virginia University, who coordinated and ran an experimental project at Cooper's Rock State Forest for the second year. The station there captured five owls on a few nights of operation, giving some WVU wildlife students some experience with this tiny eastern owl.

Once again, I would like to thank Valley Falls State Park superintendent, Ronald Fawcett, for the use of the park facilities and allowing visitors to experience the fall migration. Without Ron's support, this operation would not be possible.

# The 2014 West Virginia Christmas Bird Count

The 114th Audubon Christmas Bird Count was held from December 14, 2014, to January 5, 2015. West Virginia participated with 19 counts included in this compilation plus one count, Buffalo Creek, in Pennsylvania, which extends into Brooke County, West Virginia. Charleston, West Virginia, also participated with a count, but I could not obtain the data, so it is not included. The absence of Charleston's data makes comparisons with last year's results less than ideal. Table 1 lists the participating counts with the number of species counted, number of birds observed, and number of participants. Count dates ranged from six on December 14 to five in January. The weather was seasonable on all the counts and there was no inclement weather reported other than a few showers, unlike in other years when there was heavy rain or snow so severe that counts had to be cancelled and rescheduled.

The numbers are a good representation of the state of the bird population surveyed. However, the reader must bear in mind that some counts had heavy participation, as high as 53 surveyors on the Buffalo Creek count, and some counts had only a few participants, as few as four in Raleigh County. This variable affects the results. I would encourage the reader to consider helping with some of the counts with the lower numbers of participants. Also, the count locales have very different ecological habitats. Some count circles have large rivers and lakes, while others have none. The elevation and the amount of forested acreage also vary widely across the state. These variables affect the kinds and numbers of species observed. That said, the results were comparable over the past few years.

There were 151,450 birds observed this year, comprising 125 species. (Table 2). In 2013, 127 species were seen. Table 3 lists those species reported only once on 2014 counts. Five of these species observed only once this year were not seen on the 2013 count: Ross's Goose, Long-tailed Duck, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Rufous Hummingbird, and Common Yellow-throat. The Oregon Junco form of the Dark-eyed was reported only once, also, and is included in Table 3. Overall, the abundance of each species seemed consistent with last year's totals.

### Field Notes Fall Season

September 1 – November 30, 2014

September and October were slightly warmer than average, while November was the seventh-coldest on record in West Virginia, according to the Northeast Regional Climate Center at Cornell University. September and November were drier than average, while October was almost twice as damp as usual. A Nor'easter on November 26 and 27 dropped as much as 20 inches of snow in the state.

These notes were gathered from the National Audubon Society sponsored West Virginia Bird Listserv, and from field notes submitted to the author by e-mail, at autobock@frontiernet.net, and by regular mail. The full content of the submitted notes by the contributors of the WV Listserv may be viewed by visiting the archives at the following web site: http://list.audubon.org/archives/wv-bird.html. Birders from 35 of the 55 West Virginia counties reported sightings on the WV Listserv during the fall season.

The fall season was a good one for rarities in West Virginia. Rodney Davis spotted and photographed a **Fork-tailed Flycatcher** in Sinks Grove, Monroe County, on October 8, which will be the first state record when accepted. Robert Dean photographed a **Kirtland's Warbler** at the Allegheny Front Migratory Observatory, Grant County, on September 30, as reported by LeJay Graffious, and when accepted this will be the first nonhypothetical record in West Virginia. In addition, Bill Mills spotted a **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher** in Malden, Kanawha County on October 19, and the bird was also seen the same afternoon by David Patick, Wendell Argabrite, and Michael Griffith. If accepted it would be the fourth state record for **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher**. Overall, there were 225 species reported in the state during the fall months.

Geese, Swans, Ducks—On September 24, John Boback found a Snow Goose at Silver Lake, Preston County, where he was told the bird had been present for two months. Diane Holsinger found five Snow Geese on September 28 in Franklin, Pendleton County, also reported to be lingerers. On October 25, David Patick and Michael Griffith saw a Snow Goose at Gallipolis Ferry, Mason County. Four days later five Snow Geese in Moorefield, Hardy County, prompted a report from Diane Holsinger and Kathy King. Derek Courtney saw seven Snow Geese at Cheat Lake Park, Monongalia County, on November 27. Herb Myers spotted three Ross's Geese in Davis, Tucker County, on October 23. David Carr found a Ross's Goose on November 22 in Moorefield, Hardy County, and the bird was re-found by Frederick Atwood and Matthew Orsie during the following week. On November 30, Matthew Orsie also relayed a message from John Hubbell that a Ross's Goose had been seen in Ridgeley, Mineral County. Cackling Geese only appeared in Mason County: on November 25 Michael Griffith spotted

three **Cackling Geese** at Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam, and three days later Gary Rankin found a lone **Cackling Goose** at Gallipolis Ferry. **Canada Geese** were as usual widespread throughout the state. Derek Courtney counted an eye-popping 857 **Tundra Swans** at Cheat Lake, Monongalia County, on November 28. Other reports of **Tundra Swans** came from Harrison (RBr), Jefferson (WS), Monongalia (ADy, TB, LeJ), and Preston (DCo, TB) Counties.

Reports of waterfowl were sparser than usual this fall in West Virginia, although birders reported 24 species, including all three scoters. There were reports in at least six counties each of Wood Ducks, Gadwalls, American Wigeons, American Black Ducks, Mallards, Blue-winged Teal, Northern Shovelers, Green-winged Teal, Ringnecked Ducks, Buffleheads, Hooded Mergansers, Common Mergansers, and Ruddy **Ducks** this fall. Reports of the following species came from fewer than six counties, as noted: Northern Pintails: Mason (CE, CW, MH, LC, RU, BW), Monongalia (DCo, WA, MG, TB), Pendleton (FA), and Pleasants (JB) Counties; Canvasbacks: Monongalia County (DCo); Redheads: Hardy (FA), Mason (GR), Monongalia (DCo, WA, MG, TB, LeJ), and Taylor (AA) Counties; Greater Scaup: Hardy County (DH, KKi); Lesser Scaup: Mason (DP, MG, CE, CW, MH, LC, RU, BW), Mercer (JP), and Monongalia (TB, DCo, LeJ) Counties; Surf Scoters: Marion (DCo), Mason (DP, MG), and Monongalia (JBo, DCo, TB) Counties; White-winged Scoter: Monongalia County (DCo); Black Scoters: Monongalia (DCo) and Wood (JB) Counties); Long-tailed Ducks: Monongalia County (DCo); Common Goldeneve: Monongalia County (DCo); and Red-breasted Mergansers: Barbour (RBo), Monongalia (DCo), and Monroe (JP) Counties. Terry Bronson and LeJay Graffious saw 12 **Surf Scoters** at Cheat Lake, Monongalia County, on October 23. On November 21, Carole Del-Colle and her mother spotted a raft of 47 Common Mergansers on the Shenandoah River near Moulton Park in Jefferson County.

**Quail**—Richard Bailey relayed a credible report of a female **Northern Bobwhite** with young in Renick, Greenbrier County, on September 15. On November 2 James and Judy Phillips hosted their first two **Northern Bobwhites** at their feeders in Pipestem, Summers County.

**Grouse, Turkeys**—Reports of **Ruffed Grouse** came only from Barbour (TB), Grant (FA), Marion (TB), Monongalia (DCo), and Tucker Counties (HMy). **Wild Turkeys** inspired reports from seven counties. On October 3 Bruni Haydl saw her largest-ever flock of 31 **Wild Turkeys** near Bardane, Jefferson County.

**Loons**, **Grebes**—On November 6 Joseph Hildreth reported that a **Red-throated Loon** had been found by Ian Batterman at Cheat Lake Park, Monongalia County, and re-found by Michael Slaven. There were reports of **Common Loons** from nine counties this fall: Cabell (GR), Grant (FA), Lewis (GR), Mason (DP, MG), Monongalia (ADy, DCo, JBo, TB, LeJ), Pendleton (FA), Summers (JJP), Taylor (TB, JH), and Wood (JB). On October 12 on Cheat Lake, Monongalia County, Amanda and Julian Dymacek saw a group of five **Common Loons**, which appeared to be a family group of two adults and three juveniles. **Pied-billed Grebes** appeared widely throughout the state, and birders

found **Horned Grebes** in seven counties: Grant (FA), Jefferson (JL), Kanawha (HG), Mason (CE, CW, MH, LC, RU, BW, DP, MG), Monongalia (DCo, TB, LeJ), Taylor (TB, JH, AA), and Wood (JB). Joey Herron saw his earliest **Pied-billed Grebe** ever at Prickett's Fort State Park, Marion County, on September 5. Amanda Austin spotted two **Red-necked Grebes** still showing much of their breeding plumage at Tygart Lake Marina, Taylor County, on November 28.

**Cormorants**—Reports of **Double-crested Cormorants** came from 13 counties.

Herons, Egrets—On October 14, Joseph Hildreth, Michael Slaven, Nick Goodman, and Randy Bodkins flushed an American Bittern at Pleasant Creek Wildlife Management Area, Barbour County. Great Blue Herons, Great Egrets, and Green Herons appeared throughout much of West Virginia. On September 11 Michael Griffith spotted a Little Blue Heron at Green Bottom Wildlife Management Area, Cabell County. On September 28 Frederick Atwood found a Cattle Egret on Stony River Dam Road, Grant County, and Matthew Orsie re-found the bird two days later. David Patick, Wendell Argabrite, and Michael Griffith found another lone Cattle Egret at Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam, Mason County, on October 12.

**Vultures**—Reports of **Black Vultures** came from 8 counties, while 16 counties had reports of **Turkey Vultures**.

Hawks, Eagles—Osprey, Bald Eagles, Northern Harriers, Sharp-shinned Hawks, Cooper's Hawks, Red-shouldered Hawks, Broad-winged Hawks, and Red-tailed Hawks were all well represented in reports throughout the state during the fall season. Hanging Rock Observation Tower in Monroe County had a very good year, as watchers recorded 4,515 raptors this season, including a Northern Goshawk seen by James Phillips on October 23, and a single-day record of 13 Golden Eagles on November 12, reported by Rodney Davis. Two observers saw Northern Goshawks in Tucker County this fall: the author of these notes at his home in Dry Fork on September 16, and Randy Bodkins on Route 219 near Sugarland Road on November 5. On the same day Derek Courtney saw a juvenile Northern Goshawk chase a Ruffed Grouse at Coopers Rock State Forest, Monongalia County. Golden Eagles made appearances in Grant (FA), Monongalia (DCo), Monroe (RD, HRT), Pendleton (FA), and Raleigh (MW) Counties.

Rails, Coots—Nancy and Elliot Kirschbaum heard a Virginia Rail at Altona Marsh, Jefferson County, on November 11. On September 6 and 28, Fred Atwood found perhaps the same Sora at South Mill Creek Lake, Grant County. Terry Bronson found a Sora along Decker's Creek Rail Trail in Preston County, on October 8. On October 13, Herb Myers and Stephen Kimbrell found a Sora in Canaan Valley National Wildlife Refuge, Tucker County. On October 14, Joseph Hildreth, Michael Slaven, Nick Goodman, and Randy Bodkins spotted two Soras at Pleasant Creek WMA, Barbour County. On November 6, Diane Holsinger saw an immature Common Gallinule at Kimsey Run Dam, Hardy County. American Coots appeared in birders' reports from nine counties.

**Plovers**—It was another poor season for migratory **plover** reports in West Virginia. On November 5 Derek Courtney found the season's only **American Golden-Plover** 

at Cheat Lake, Monongalia County. On September 11 Michael Griffith spotted three **Semipalmated Plovers** at Gallipolis Ferry, Mason County. In contrast to other **plover** species, **Killdeer** were well represented with reports from 19 counties.

Sandpipers—Sandpiper reports were once again relatively few this fall, as West Virginia birders reported members of only nine sandpiper species. Solitary Sandpipers, Greater Yellowlegs, and Wilson's Snipe prompted reports in seven counties each. Reports of the following shorebirds came from the counties listed: Spotted Sandpipers: Hardy (FA), Kanawha (HG), Mason (GR, DP, MG), Monongalia (TB), Raleigh (MW), and Tucker (HMy, SKi); Willet: Monongalia (TB, AA); Lesser Yellowlegs: Cabell (MG), Hardy (FA), Monongalia (DCo), and Wood (JB); Least Sandpiper: Cabell (MG, WA); Pectoral Sandpiper: Cabell (GR, MG, WA, DP); and American Woodcock: Barbour (TB), Monongalia (JBk), Pendleton (DH), and Wood (KCa).

Gulls, Terns—It was a relatively slow season once again for inland seabirds, which were mostly observed in small numbers. Bonaparte's Gulls were sighted in Monongalia (DCo) and Tucker (HMy) Counties; reports of Ring-billed Gulls came from Jefferson (CD), Kanawha (HG), Monongalia (TB, DCo, LeJ), Pleasants (JT), Putnam (GR), and Wayne (GR) Counties; and Herring Gulls were reported in Grant (FA), Mason (GR, DP, MG), Monongalia (DCo), and Taylor (AA) Counties. On September 2 Hillar Klandorf saw three Caspian Terns flying over Edith Barill Park in Morgantown, Monongalia County, and Michael Griffith watched a Black Tern feeding on the river at Green Bottom WMA, Cabell County. On the next day James Phillips scoped a Caspian Tern at Bertha Campground, Summers County, and Gary Rankin found two Common Terns at Beech Fork Lake, Wayne County. On September 14 Michael Slaven saw and photographed a Caspian Tern and several Common Terns from the Tygart Lake Lodge, Taylor County.

**Pigeons**, **Doves—Rock Pigeons** and **Mourning Doves** continue to reside throughout the state.

Cuckoos—Cuckoo sightings were sparse in West Virginia this fall, continuing the pattern from the summer. On September 3 James Phillips saw a Yellow-billed Cuckoo at Bertha Campground, Summers County. Jon Benedetti and the Mountwood Bird Club spotted a Yellow-billed Cuckoo at McDonough Wildlife Refuge in Wood County, on September 18. On September 26 Wilma Jarrell hosted a Yellow-billed Cuckoo in her yard in Wileyville, Wetzel County. Terry Bronson saw the only Black-billed Cuckoo reported this fall at Pleasant Creek WMA, Barbour County, on October 1.

Owls—West Virginia birders submitted more owl reports than usual this fall. Richard Bailey reported a Barn Owl and a possible roost site in an old silo near Sunlight, Greenbrier County, on September 15. On September 20 Derek Courtney found a Barn Owl in Canaan Valley State Park, Tucker County, marking the second year in a row in which the species has been seen in this location. Birders in six counties reported Eastern Screech-Owls: Barbour (JD), Grant (FA), Jefferson (JBz), Monongalia (JBo, DCo), Pleasants (JB), and Tucker (DCo). There were reports of Great Horned Owls in four

counties: Jefferson (JBz), Marion (DCo), Summers (JJP), and Tucker (MK); and observers reported **Barred Owls** in five counties: Grant (FA), Kanawha (JJ), Marion (DCo), Summers (JJP), and Tucker (DCo, EH). On September 8 Jeff Del Col heard **Northern Saw-Whet Owls** calling from the spruce and hemlock stand near his house in Philippi, Barbour County. Derek Courtney called in a **Northern Saw-Whet Owl** in Canaan Valley, Tucker County, on September 20.

Goatsuckers, Swifts—September 3 was a good day to see Common Nighthawks in West Virginia, with reports from the following counties: Barbour (JD), Nicholas (JS), Putnam (CE), Randolph (RB), Summers (JJP), and Wetzel (WJ). Common Nighthawks were also reported in Cabell (JHu), Grant (FA), Jefferson (CD), Kanawha (HG), Mercer (JJP), Raleigh (MW), and Tucker (CR) Counties. Cynthia Ellis counted 1,022 Common Nighthawks flying by her home in Red House, Putnam County, during the first 13 days of September. There were only eight counties with reports of Chimney Swifts, all before October 6. On September 24 Diane Sylvester watched approximately 500 Chimney Swifts dropping into a chimney at Shepherd College, Jefferson County.

**Hummingbirds**—Birders in 12 counties reported sightings of **Ruby-throated Hummingbirds**, primarily in September. For the second year in a row, on October 13 Bruni Haydl saw the last-reported **Ruby-throated Hummingbird** of the season at her home in Charles Town, Jefferson County. Michael Slaven hosted an adult female **Rufous Hummingbird** at his home in Morgantown, Monongalia County, on and off between November 17 and November 29.

**Kingfishers**—There were reports of **Belted Kingfisher** in 15 counties.

Woodpeckers—Red-headed Woodpeckers, Red-bellied Woodpeckers, Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers, Downy Woodpeckers, Hairy Woodpeckers, Northern Flickers, and Pileated Woodpeckers were all widely reported, with sightings of Red-headed Woodpeckers in eight counties: Grant (FA), Hardy (DH, FA, BD), Jefferson (JBz), Kanawha (HG), Marion (DCo), Mercer (JP), Ritchie (TB, JBo), and Wetzel (WJ).

Falcons—It was a good fall for falcons in West Virginia. American Kestrels continued to appear widely throughout the state. Merlins made many appearances, with reports from Grant County (FA, TB), Hardy County (DH, DC), Jefferson County (JBz), Kanawha County (JWa), Marion County (DCo), Monongalia County (GN, JBo, TB, AA), Pleasants County (JB), Randolph County (RBo), and Tucker County (FA). There were reports of Peregrine Falcons from 11 counties. As he was leaving the Brooks Bird Club Annual Meeting, Ryan Tomazin spotted a Peregrine Falcon flying over the Blackwater Falls State Park lodge on October 19, an uncommon sighting in Tucker County.

Flycatchers—It was a second remarkable fall season in a row for flycatchers, including the sightings of first-record Fork-tailed Flycatcher and fourth-record Scissortailed Flycatcher described near the beginning of these notes. Wilma Jarrell spotted an Olive-sided Flycatcher near her home in Wileyville, Wetzel County, on September 8. Reports of Eastern Wood-Pewees came from 11 counties. Yellow-bellied Flycatchers appeared in Cabell (MG), Marion (DCo), Mason (MG, WA), and Putnam (CE) Counties.

On September 14 David Patick, Wendell Argabrite, Michael Griffith, and Gary Rankin saw the season's only reported **Acadian Flycatcher** on the ridges of Cabell County. Gary Rankin and David Patick saw a **Willow Flycatcher** at Green Bottom WMA, Cabell County, on September 29. On September 18 Jon Benedetti and the Mountwood Bird Club found two **Least Flycatchers** at McDonough Wildlife Refuge in Wood County; but for the second year in a row, theirs was not the only report, as Steven Kimbrell found another **Least Flycatcher** in Canaan Valley State Park, Tucker County, on September 27. **Eastern Phoebes** were reported widely in the state, with the last report of the season from Elliot Kirschbaum in Altona Marsh, Jefferson County, on November 11. Joette Borzik heard a **Great Crested Flycatcher** in her yard in Jefferson County on September 9.

**Shrikes**—Fred Atwood found a **Loggerhead Shrike** on Hogueland Lane, Grant County, on September 6. Richard Bailey reported **Loggerhead Shrikes** at previously known locations in the Greenbrier Valley in Greenbrier, Monroe, and Pocahontas Counties, on September 15 and October 29. On November 16 Matthew Orsie found a **Loggerhead Shrike** near Shepherds Mill Road, Jefferson County.

Vireos—White-eyed, Yellow-throated, Blue-headed, Philadelphia, and Red-eyed Vireos appeared in counties throughout the state during September and early October. Blue-headed Vireos were seen through November 1. Reporting birders observed Warbling Vireos in Cabell (DP, WA, MG, GR), Marion (JoH), and Summers (JP) Counties during the first half of September.

Crows, Jays, Ravens—Blue Jays, American Crows, and Common Ravens prompted many reports throughout West Virginia. Birders reported **Fish Crows** only in Jefferson County (DHa, JBz) during the fall.

**Larks—Horned Larks** appeared occasionally this fall in Grant (FA), Hardy (FA), Jefferson (JL, WS), and Mason (MG) Counties.

Swallows—Tree Swallows lingered in eight counties as late as November 6 when Deborah Hale saw two Tree Swallows and a Northern Rough-winged Swallow in Harpers Ferry, Jefferson County. Frederick Atwood saw 40 Tree, 2 Northern Rough-winged, 4 Cliff, and 110 Barn Swallows at Hogueland Lane, Grant County, on September 6. On September 17 Kathy King, Diane Holsinger, and Jane Whitaker found thousands of swallows, including Tree, Northern Rough-winged, Bank, Cliff, and Barn Swallows, in western Hardy County. Gary Rankin spotted four Cliff Swallows at Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam, Mason County, on September 7. Barn Swallows also appeared in Greenbrier (RBi), Jefferson (JBz), Kanawha (HG), Monongalia (TB, GN, JH), Pleasants (TB), Summers (JP), and Wetzel (WJ) Counties.

Chickadees, Titmice—Black-capped and Carolina Chickadees made their usual appearances in their bifurcated territories in West Virginia. Tufted Titmice were widely reported throughout the state as well.

**Nuthatches**—**Red-breasted Nuthatches** occasioned reports from only five West Virginia counties this season: Jefferson (CD), Monongalia (TB), Pendleton (FA), Preston (TB), and Summers (JP). **White-breasted Nuthatches** occupied their usual spots

in reports from throughout the state.

Creepers—Birders in six counties reported **Brown Creeper**: Hardy (FA), Jefferson (JBz, CD, DHa, BH, EK), Kanawha (HG), Pleasants (JB), Summers (JP), and Wood (JB).

Wrens—House Wrens were mostly gone by early September, with appearances only in Grant (FA), Hardy (FA, DH), Lewis (JBw), Pleasants (JB), Preston (TB), and Wood (JB) Counties. Winter Wrens and Carolina Wrens appeared in good numbers in reports from many parts of the state. On September 22 Michael Griffith and Wendell Argabrite found a Sedge Wren at Green Bottom WMA, Cabell County, and on October 22, Joseph Hildreth, Kyle and Joni Aldinger, Randy Bodkins, and John Boback spotted a Sedge Wren at Pleasant Creek WMA, Barbour County. Marsh Wrens occasioned reports from Barbour (TB, JH), Cabell (DP, WA, MG, GR), Hardy (DH, MJ), Mason (MG, DP, WA), Randolph (RBo), and Tucker (CR) Counties.

**Gnatcatchers**—Birders in Hardy (DH), Kanawha (HG), Mason (DP, WA, MG), Monroe (JP), and Wetzel (WJ) Counties reported **Blue-gray Gnatcatchers** all during September.

**Kinglets**—**Golden-crowned** and **Ruby-crowned Kinglets** inspired reports throughout the state this fall.

Thrushes—It was a quiet fall for thrushes in West Virginia. Eastern Bluebirds, Swainson's Thrushes, Hermit Thrushes, and American Robins were all seen widely in reporting counties. James Phillips reported the only Veery of the season at Hanging Rock Tower Observatory, Monroe County, on September 9. Gray-cheeked Thrushes appeared in Grant (FA), Mason (MG, WA), Summers (JP), and Taylor (JoH) Counties, and Wood Thrushes occasioned reports in Jefferson (JBz, JN), Mason (DP, GR), Summers (JP), and Wetzel (WJ) Counties.

Mockingbirds, Thrashers—There were reports of Gray Catbirds and Northern Mockingbirds from counties throughout the state this fall. Brown Thrashers appeared in reports from Barbour (TB), Grant (FA), Monongalia (TB), Preston (TB), and Wood (JB) Counties.

**Starlings**—**European Starlings** continued to occupy widespread habitats throughout West Virginia.

**Pipits—American Pipits** appeared only in reports from Grant (FA), Hardy (FA, MO), and Mason (MG, WA) Counties this fall.

Waxwings—Cedar Waxwings prompted reports from throughout the state.

**Buntings**—On November 22, David Carr found a single **Snow Bunting** at Kimsey Run Lake, Hardy County. It was the third year in a row that he found at least one **Snow Bunting** at that location during the fall. This year N. Wade Snyder also discovered a **Snow Bunting**, near his office in Bardane, Jefferson County, on November 28.

**Warblers**—Robert Dean's discovery of a **Kirtland's Warbler** in September is described near the beginning of these notes. Michael Griffith and Wendell Argabrite spotted a "**Brewster's**" **Warbler** (**Golden-winged** x **Blue-winged** hybrid) among the ridges and hollows of Cabell County on September 18. Although birders in West Vir-

ginia found 33 species this fall, reports of warblers were generally sparse. Hullet Good reported the worst fall for warblers at his home in Milliken, Kanawha County, since he began observing in 1973. Warbler species reported in six or fewer counties are listed below with the counties and contributors. Species listed without contributors were reported in at least seven counties. Warblers reported this fall included **Ovenbird**: Wetzel County (WJ); Worm-eating: Cabell (DP, WA, MG, GR) and Monroe (JP) Counties; Louisiana Waterthrush: Barbour County (TB); Northern Waterthrush: Cabell (TI) and Tucker (HMy) Counties; **Blue-winged**: Cabell (DP, WA, MG, GR) and Tucker (CR) Counties; Black-and-white; Prothonotary: Grant County (FA); Tennessee; Orangecrowned: Jefferson (JF), Monongalia (DCo), Preston (JBo, MSl, DD), and Tucker (CR) Counties; Nashville; Connecticut: Monongalia (KA), Preston (TB), Randolph (DCo) and Wetzel (WJ) Counties; Common Yellowthroat; Hooded: Barbour (TB), Cabell (DP, WA, MG, GR), Lewis (JBw), Mason (GR, DP), Randolph (HMy), and Wetzel (WJ) Counties; American Redstart; Cape May; Cerulean: Pleasants County (JB); Northern Parula: Cabell (MG, WA) and Monongalia (TB) Counties; Magnolia; Bay-breasted: Cabell (MG, WA, GR, DP), Grant (FA), Mason (MG, WA, GR), Wayne (MG, DP), and Wetzel (WJ) Counties; **Blackburnian**; **Yellow**: Grant (FA), Monongalia (JBo), and Pleasants (JT) Counties; Chestnut-sided; Blackpoll; Black-throated Blue; Palm; Pine: Cabell (MG, WA, GR, DP), Grant (FA), Hardy (DH), Mason (DP, WA, MG), Monongalia (JBo), and Wayne (DP) Counties; Yellow-rumped; Yellow-throated: Cabell (MG, WA), Mason (GR, WA, MG), and Raleigh (MW) Counties; Prairie: Cabell (MG, WA), Monongalia (TB), and Putnam (GR) Counties; **Black-throated Green**; **Canada**: Cabell (MG), Kanawha (TI), and Wayne (MG) Counties; and Wilson's: Grant (FA), Jefferson (JBz), and Preston (TB, JBo) Counties. On September 8 Kim Kazmierski's first warbler of the season in Hurricane, Putnam County, was also the first reported Palm Warbler of the season in West Virginia. On September 23, an **Orange-crowned Warbler** was a life bird for James Farley at Altona Marsh in Jefferson County.

Towhees, Sparrows, Juncos—For the third year in a row, Nelson's Sparrow was West Virginia's emberizid of the fall season, with sightings by Joseph Hildreth, Michael Slaven, Nick Goodman, and Randy Bodkins of up to three individuals at Pleasant Creek WMA, Barbour County, from October 14 through 21. The most-frequently reported species of emberizid this fall were Eastern Towhee and Chipping, Field, Savannah, Fox, Song, Lincoln's, Swamp, White-throated, and White-crowned Sparrows, as well as Dark-eyed Juncos. The following were reported only as listed: American Tree Sparrows in Mason (DP, MG) and Tucker (HMy) Counties; Vesper Sparrows in Jefferson (DHa), Mason (MG, WA), Monongalia (JBo), and Pleasants (JB) Counties; and Grasshopper Sparrows in Monongalia County (TB, KA). Gretchen Nareff spotted the first White-throated Sparrows of the season, in Albright, Monongalia County, on September 27.

Tanagers, Cardinals, Grosbeaks, Buntings—Summer Tanagers appeared in reports from Pleasants (JB) and Wood (JB) Counties. Scarlet Tanagers, Northern Car-

dinals, Rose-breasted Grosbeaks, and Indigo Buntings prompted numerous reports from birders in most parts of the state. On September 16, Rodney Bartgis and Robert Dean saw two immature Blue Grosbeaks on Hogueland Lane in Grant County. Michael Slaven, John Boback, and Kyle Aldinger reported Blue Grosbeaks in Little Indian Creek Wildlife Management Area, Monongalia County, in late September.

Blackbirds, Allies—Richard Bailey flushed approximately 100 Bobolinks in a field near Renick, Greenbrier County, in early September. David Patick, Wendell Argabrite, and Michael Griffith reported the only other Bobolink of the season, at Ashton Wetlands, Mason County, on October 5. West Virginia birders reported Red-winged Blackbirds and Rusty Blackbirds in 12 counties each, Eastern Meadowlarks in seven counties, and Common Grackles in nine counties. Brown-headed Cowbirds reports came from Hardy (FA), Jefferson (JBz. EK, BT), Pendleton (FA), Pleasants (JB, GR), Randolph (HMy), and Wood (JB) Counties. Baltimore Orioles appeared in reports from Hardy (DH), Wetzel (WJ), and Wood (JB) Counties. On November 14 Mindy Waldron hosted a flock of icterids in her yard in Surveyer, Raleigh County, including 3 Redwinged Blackbirds, 4 Rusty Blackbirds, and 31 Common Grackles.

**Finches**, **Allies**—Reports of **House Finches**, **Purple Finches**, **Pine Siskins**, and **American Goldfinches** were widespread in the state, occurring in at least eight counties each. Notably, **Pine Siskins** appeared in 16 counties, compared to only two counties during the fall of 2013. On October 15 Hullet Good watched a mother **American Goldfinch** feeding her three fledglings at his home in Milliken, Kanawha County.

**Weaver Finches**—The **House Sparrow** prompted reports from only six counties. In spite of this lack of attention, the species no doubt continues throughout the state, primarily in urban settings.
