### Special Aspects

The WVOH count on Dec 26 coincided with the final day of Winter Storm Elliott in our area. To note, the storm began in the Pacific Northwest on Dec. 20 moving east, and became a bomb cyclone by the time it arrived in WV the morning of Dec 23. The storm produced a freezing line as far south as Mobile Bay, which partially froze, and Central Florida. It's likely the Sandhill Cranes moved east trying to stay ahead of the storm, then circled back.
